A Note About the Service

This "Service of Lament, Service of Hope" may seem strange to modern Americans, who tend to lie to ourselves about pain and either ignore suffering or find ways to medicate ourselves to happiness despite sorrow. Instead, this service aims to hold in tension two seemingly competing realities: God has promised that He will be merciful and good, and yet His human creatures often suffer painfully. On the one hand, God is good and is the Creator of the heavens and the earth. He is in control of all things. Yet His creatures experience suffering, physical and mental pain, frustration, disappointment, anger, doubt, sadness, and disillusionment. We do not attempt to reconcile these realities, but we recognize and honor the reality of suffering and questions it brings.

This service does not aim to reconcile this breach in our lives or explain it away. Instead, we will marshal the resources of God's people to give voice to our pain, frustration, and sadness. This morning's liturgy thus follows a pattern of the Lament Psalms: we will acknowledge God's power and dominion over the whole earth and his rule of every person and situation; we will lay our laments before Him, begging, even demanding, salvation and deliverance; and we will end the service with a message of hope, clinging to God's promises in Christ.

Our goal is not that suffering will go away. Indeed, we invite all to recognize suffering in their lives and the lives of others without trying to resolve it. Instead, we desire to place our suffering in the hands of God-the God who suffered for and with us and has promised to redeem us. We eagerly, even impatiently, await that redemption. With that waiting comes suffering. It is the two-fold reality of suffering and promised redemption we recognize and honor.

This service will also allow us a time to consider the laments of our brothers and sisters in Christ, both throughout the history of faith and in our current situation today, and to see the pains of the whole world. While some of us may not have any present laments, many in our Christian family do. The whole world also suffers under the weight of sin and brokenness. The litany for today's service will pull together various laments from our community across time and locations. As we lament together, we invite you to hear those laments and recognize that we all live in a world of suffering, eagerly anticipating its redemption. Thus, these laments are not individual, but communal, and we pray that as the family of Christ, we encourage each other all the more as we see the day approaching in which all laments will be redeemed in the return of our Lord.

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

Service of the Word

First Reading

Ezra 3:8-13

Now in the second year after their coming to the house of God at Jerusalem, in the second month, Zerubbabel the son of Shealtiel and Jeshua the son of Jozadak made a beginning, together with the rest of their kinsmen, the priests and the Levites and all who had come to Jerusalem from the captivity. They appointed the Levites, from twenty years old and upward, to supervise the work of the house of the LORD. And Jeshua with his sons and his brothers, and Kadmiel and his sons, the sons of Judah, together supervised the workmen in the house of God, along with the sons of Henadad and the Levites, their sons and brothers. And when the builders laid the foundation of the temple of the LORD, the priests in their vestments came forward with trumpets, and the Levites, the sons of Asaph, with cymbals, to praise the LORD, according to the directions of David king of Israel. 

Second Reading

Luke 11:14-28

Now [Jesus] was casting out a demon that was mute. When the demon had gone out, the mute man spoke, and the people marveled. But some of them said, "He casts out demons by Beelzebul, the prince of demons," while others, to test Him, kept seeking from Him a sign from heaven. But He, knowing their thoughts, said to them, "Every kingdom divided against itself is laid waste, and a divided household falls. And if Satan also is divided against himself, how will his kingdom stand? For you say that I cast out demons by Beelzebul. And if I cast out demons by Beelzebul, by whom do your sons cast them out? Therefore they will be your judges. But if it is by the finger of God that I cast out demons, then the kingdom of God has come upon you. When a strong man, fully armed, guards his own palace, his goods are safe; but when one stronger than he attacks him and overcomes him, he takes away his armor in which he trusted and divides his spoil. Whoever is not with Me is against Me, and whoever does not gather with Me scatters. "When the unclean spirit has gone out of a person, it passes through waterless places seeking rest, and finding none it says, 'I will return to my house from which I came.' And when it comes, it finds the house swept and put in order. Then it goes and brings seven other spirits more evil than itself, and they enter and dwell there. And the last state of that person is worse than the first." As He said these things, a woman in the crowd raised her voice and said to Him, "Blessed is the womb that bore You, and the breasts at which You nursed!" But He said, "Blessed rather are those who hear the word of God and keep it!"


