From the Pastor

Last month, I referenced the book, *Heaven on Earth: The Gifts of Christ in the Divine Service*, by Dr. Arthur Just. I focused on how, in the Word and Sacraments as we receive them in the liturgy of the Divine Service, heaven and earth are joined together as God comes to His people. This is one of the main themes of the book, *Heaven on Earth* (as the title itself would suggest). However, I would also like to focus on another theme that is prominent in Dr. Just's book: The question of whether we shape the liturgy, or whether the liturgy shapes us.

We, in our typical America self-centered outlook, tend to think that "worship" is what we do for God, and so we can decide how we would like to worship. In Biblical and Lutheran theology, this is actually backwards. Worship is not about what we do for God, but about what God does for us. God comes to us and showers down His blessings upon us. In worship, God is the giver, and we have the joy of receiving His love and grace.

This means that we are not the ones who control and shape what is done in worship. God is the giver, His gifts are the central focus. The best understanding is not that we shape the liturgy to be what we want, instead the liturgy shapes us to be the people that God wants us to be.

Dr. Just writes, “Lutheran Liturgy creates its own culture. There is a common assumption today that the liturgy must reflect the language and the ethos of the current culture. If this is true, then liturgies will veer toward the pop culture in which we live. These culturally devised liturgies are at times exciting and entertaining, but are not transcultural. At most, they will only give immediate satisfaction. These liturgies then become just another expression of the culture's malaise, a feel-good, shallow, and artificially uplifting sentimentality” (Just 28-29).

In contrast to this, Dr. Just writes, “Lutheran worship is its own culture, distinct from both the pop culture of secular society and the worship that characterizes most evangelical denominations in our country today. The Lutheran Church must develop and maintain its own cultural language that reflects the values and structures of Scripture, not of the current culture” (Just 29).

The liturgy is not something that should seem natural or immediately comfortable. The liturgy is intended to shape us, not coddle us. The liturgy is not there for us to shape to our preferences, to change and adapt to our whims and wishes. Instead, the liturgy is there to bring God's Word and God's gifts to us, and in so doing, change us. We enter the Divine Service as sinners, we leave as saints. We enter the Divine Service forsaken, we leave forgiven. We enter the Divine Service estranged, we leave embraced. We enter the Divine service famished, we leave fed. The liturgy is there for God to do His work on us and in us. The liturgy is not there for us to transform to fit our ideas and outlooks, the liturgy is there for God to work through His Word and Sacraments to transform us.

Understanding and accepting this takes a good bit of humility on our part. As I mentioned before, Americans tend to be rather self-centered. We like to be the focus of attention, and think that we are the ones in control and calling the shots. We are rugged individuals, accountable only to ourselves and our own desires. The liturgy of the Divine Service collides with that self-centered sensibility. The liturgy of the Divine Service places God at the center, not us. It reminds us that we are not the ones in control in the Church. God is.

The transformation from being self-centered individuals to being God's holy people shaped in His image, conforming to His thoughts and desires, is not a quick or easy process. It is a painful experience for our sinful egos to be knocked down time and time again as we need to be filled with God's ideas and thoughts rather than our own. That is one reason why the liturgy is there, in very similar format, week after week. We are slow and stubborn learners. We need the message repeated regularly. The liturgy provides this regular message that we are not the boss, we are not in control. God's gifts, as given in the liturgy of the Divine Service, are not ours to control, they are ours to receive...and that changes us.

So, set your sinful self-centeredness aside, and let the liturgy do its work. Through His gifts of Word and Sacrament, delivered to us in the liturgy of the Divine Service, let God work to change you into His child in His image. We don't come to church to enforce our ideas on others, and shape the workings of the Church to what we want. We don't change the liturgy, the liturgy changes us. We don't shape the liturgy, the liturgy shapes us. Let the liturgy do its work. That is, let God do His work in you.

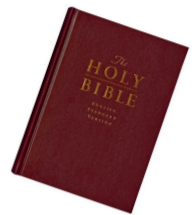

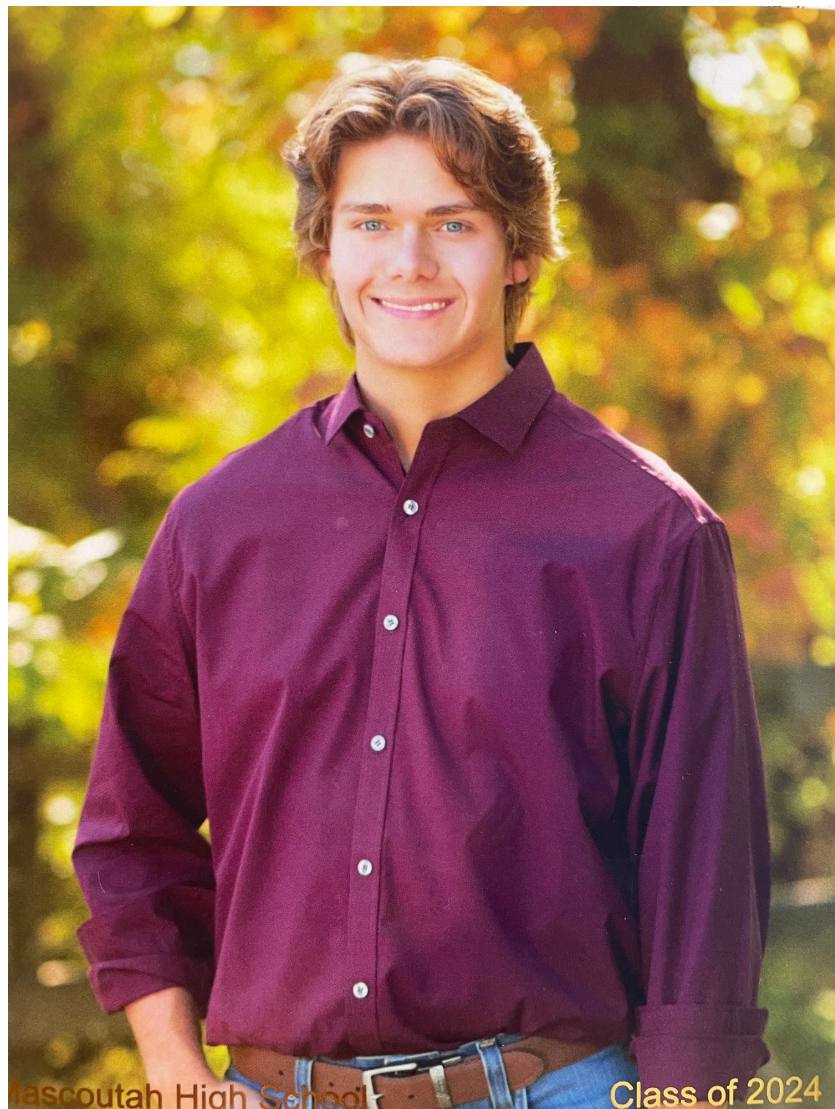

The Gift of Contentment

As children grow up, they often feel cramped by their parents' restrictions. Dad says to be home by 11. But why can't I say out 'til midnight? Mom says to clean your room on Saturday morning. But I want to sleep in late, then roll out of bed, hop in the car and go to my friend's house without delay. I want to do what I decide is best.

The older we get, and especially when we have kids of our own, we begin to see the truth. Mom and Dad were not cramping our style or trying to crush our personal freedom — they were looking out for us, providing for us and teaching us a better way of life.

If that's how it is with fallible human parents, how much more so with our Heavenly Father! We sinners often feel cramped by the Law of God. Our sinful flesh wants to go its own way, do its own thing and be in charge. But in our heart of hearts, we know how foolish this is. We know that God loves us, and therefore all of His commands are for our benefit. Each one of His commandments is meant to bless us. Consider the last two commandments:

You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not scheme to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, or get it in a way which only appears right, but help and be of service to him in keeping it. (SC II)

You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not entice or force away our neighbor's wife, workers, or animals, or turn them against him, but urge them to stay and do their duty. (SC II)

The commandments against coveting are warning us against losing one of the greatest gifts we can possess: contentment. Being content and thankful with what God has provided for us is a necessary building block of living a happy life. Unthankful coveting of what we have not been given will only make us miserable, so God warns us against it.

God has proven His love for us in sending His only begotten Son to shed His blood for us, cleanse us of our sins and brings us back into His family. If He loves us this much, then when percentage of His commandments do you think are meant to harm us? Probably no more than one or two percent, right? Of course that's absurd. God means to bless us with everything He says to us. The Law of God simply describes what a truly happy life, lived in thankfulness to Christ, looks like: It's a generous, merciful, contented life that uses all of the resources God has given us for His purposes.

New Business: Summer sack lunch program - our church has the week of June 17-21.

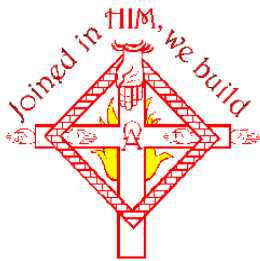
